English

This half term, we are starting to work on developing both our fiction and non-fiction writing by studying a range of fairy tales and writing a fairy tale narrative to entertain our peers. We will again focus on a range of literary and grammatical devices to draw in and hold our readers.

Maths

In maths this half term, we are looking at geometry and statistics whilst continuing to use our learnt calculation skills to help solve multi-step word problems within these two topics also. We will also continue to practise our known number skills and arithmetic in the lead up to the SATS tests.

Science

In science this term, our topic is 'Animals including humans' Throughout this unit we will find out how to identify the features and functions of the human heart. From here, we plan to use that knowledge and extend on our knowledge of how to live a healthylife

Religious Education I'n this unit of RE, we will be looking at the questions What do Christians believe Jesus did to 'save' people?' This unit will look at the many different ways in which Christians choose to worship God and honour the sacrifices made for them.

Humanities

This term in Year 6 we will be studying a history unit which looks at widening our understanding of 'Social History' This unit deals with understanding the concept of civil rights and the origins of many of our lawstoday.

Music

This half term we are aiming for the children to be able to sing musically for purpose. To understand genre and to be able to identify features of music.

The fourth PSHE Unit will enable children to develop a deeperunderstanding of what it means to be in a gang, to be exploited and to name illegal substances. The resources aim to teach pupils about the risks and health implications of legal and illegal substances, with a focus on the development of skills such as assertiveness and resisting peer pressure.

We are continuing with our study of African Masks for this second half of spring. We will be studying the various styles of masks worn by a few of the African countries and acknowledging the meaning before constructing an abstract form of our own
